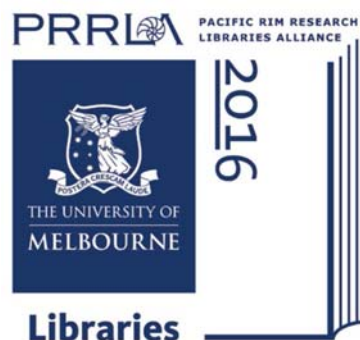

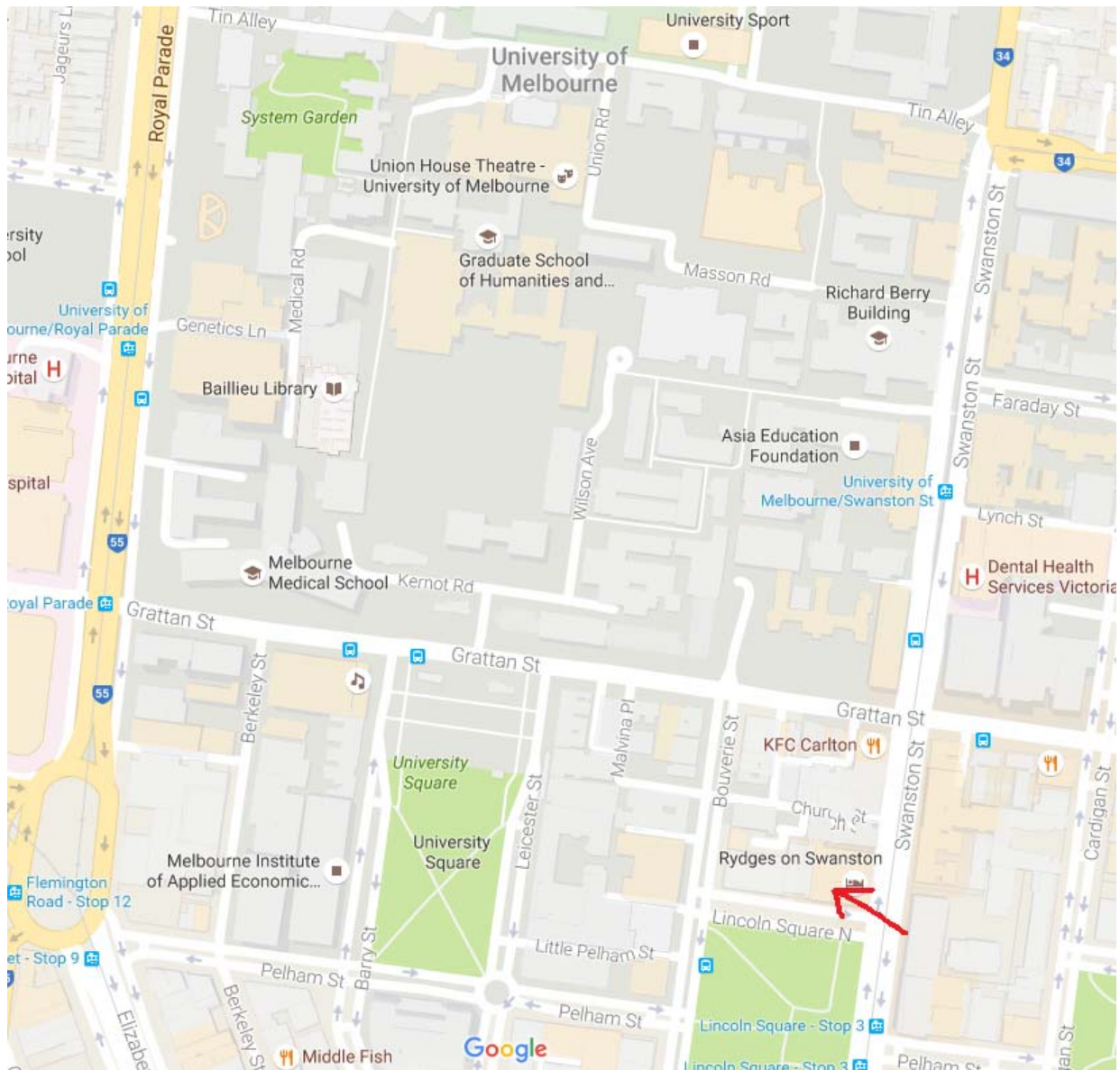

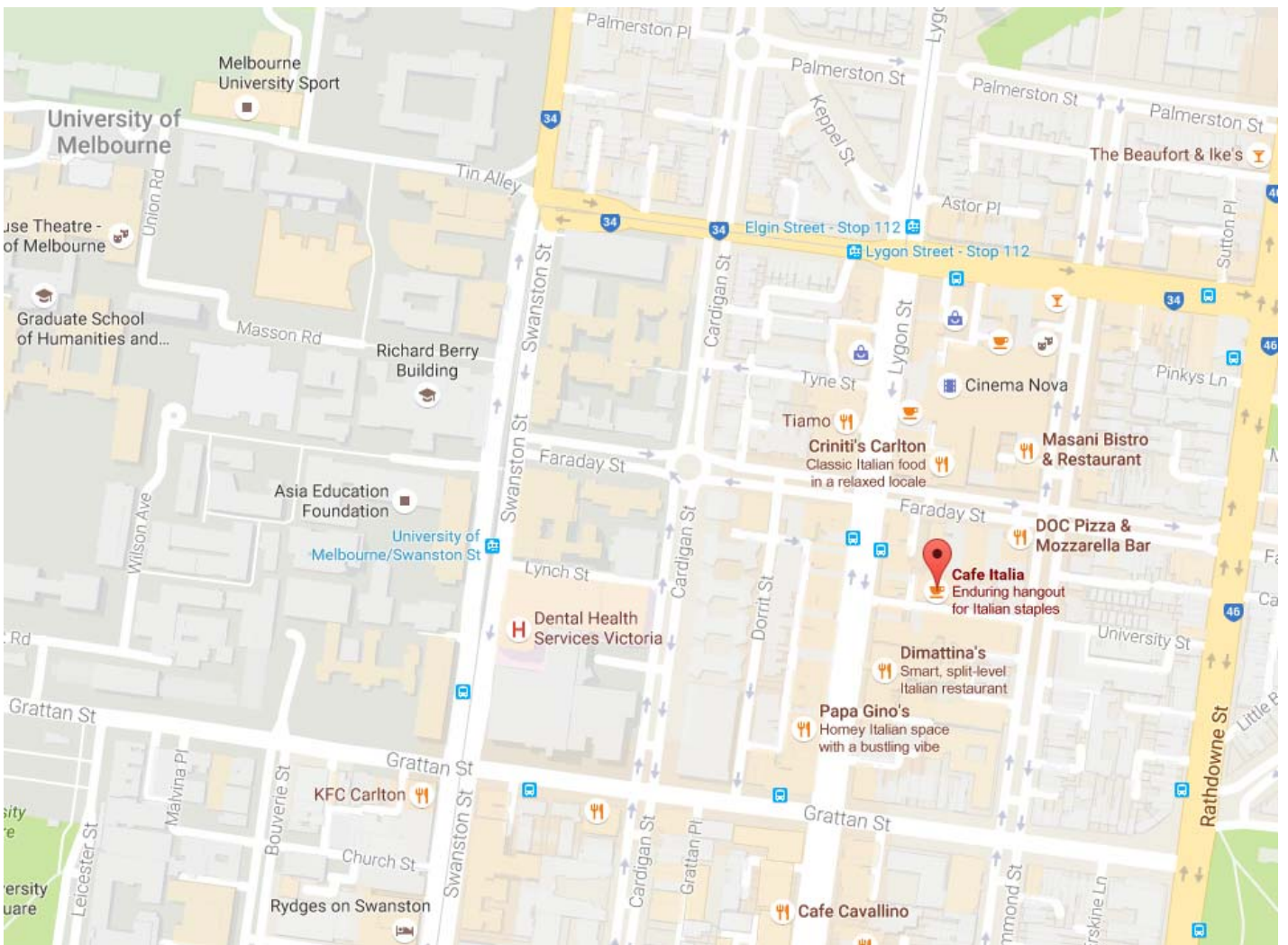

JONATHAN BENGTON

University Librarian, University of Victoria, British Columbia

Jonathan Bengtson is University Librarian at the University of Victoria, British Columbia. Since the mid-1990s, he has been director of academic and special libraries in Canada, the United States, and the United Kingdom, including appointments at the University of St. Michael's College at the University of Toronto; the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies, Toronto; Corpus Christi College and The Queen's College, University of Oxford; and, the Providence Athenaeum. Bengtson has a summa cum laude BA from the University of California – Santa Cruz, an M.Phil. in history from the University of Oxford, and an MLIS from University College London, UK. He is the current President of Canadiana.org and of the British Columbia Electronic Library Network, and serves on various boards within and outside of the profession, including the Multicultural History Society of Ontario and the Pacific Opera Victoria.

While at the University of Toronto he coordinated the partnership with the Open Content Alliance/Internet Archive and Microsoft Live Books mass digitization projects, and was a lead founder in an ongoing international partnership to explore large data set linguistic analyses of digitized text collections. Bengtson is active in publishing and teaching on topics on the history of the book, the history and future of libraries, modern library management, and the implications of digitization and evolving digital scholarship. He is the founding editor of the new peer-reviewed, open access journal KULA: knowledge creation, dissemination, and preservation studies (<http://kula.uvic.ca/>).

RACHEL BUCHANAN

Curator, Germaine Greer Archive, The University of Melbourne

Dr Rachel Buchanan is the author of *Stop Press: the last days of newspapers* (Scribe, 2013) and *The Parihaka Album: Lest We Forget* (Huia, 2010). The press book is based on her work as a newspaper journalist, the *Parihaka* one grew from her PhD in history, research that examined history-making about a community of non-violent indigenous resisters to colonisation in New Zealand. She was State Library of Victoria creative fellow 2013-14 and created Melbourne Sirius, an artist newspaper. Rachel is a member of Te Pouhere Korero Maori historians collective and her work on anti-colonial history, the politics of archives and historical injustice has been published in Te Pouhere Korero and other peer-reviewed journals in the United States, Australia and New Zealand. Her writing on shame and apology was used by iwi (tribal) and Crown negotiators in the recent Taranaki iwi Treaty claim settlement. In 2011, Rachel used an Australian Book Review Myer Fund Fellowship to research and write a 10,000-word essay on the politics of collecting personal papers. She was a staff journalist at

The Age (1993-2002) and a contributor and columnist at The Age and Good Weekend magazine from 2002-2012. Between 2007 and 2011 Rachel was an academic at La Trobe University. She taught journalism. Rachel's essay on the Germaine Greer Archive, The Female Eunuch and Greer's Shakespeare scholarship is published in The Conversation Yearbook 2016 (Melbourne University Press), '50 standout articles from Australia's top thinkers'. 'Orimupiko 22 and the haze of history' and 'For the trees' were published in Tell You What: Great New Zealand Non-Fiction (Auckland University Press, 2014 and 2015).

Rachel Buchanan collaborated with New York-based land artist Agnes Denes on the restoration of 'A Forest for Australia' (1998). As a result, City West Water have spent \$90,000 on repairing this forest at the Altona sewage treatment plant.

DIANA L. H. CHAN

University Librarian, Hong Kong University of Science and Technology

Ms. Diana L.H. Chan has been the University Librarian at the Hong Kong University of Science & Technology (HKUST) since 2012. She had previously worked in USA, and Canada before returning to Hong Kong with former posts held at Bain & Company, University of British Columbia, Chinese University of Hong Kong, and City University of Hong Kong. Having worked in management consulting, reference services, digital services, public services, she has moved into library administration. She received her Bachelor of Business Administration at the Chinese University of Hong Kong and Master of Library Science from San Jose State University, USA.

Ms. Chan has published, presented papers and delivered talks on various topics including library strategic management, staff development, space development, Learning Commons, institutional repository, digital libraries, e-books, usage of e-resources, DDA, digital reference, information literacy, research support service, shared ILS, etc. in academic journals, books, book chapters, professional conferences and seminars. Served as Chair of JULAC (Joint University Librarians Advisory Committee in Hong Kong) in 2015/16, Chair of JULAC Access Services Committee in 2012-15, Chair of JULAC Consortial Committee in 2016/17, Hong Kong Public Libraries Advisory Committee in 2016-18 and many university-wide committees.

SU CHEN

Head of the Richard C. Rudolf East Asian Library, University of California, Los Angeles

Su Chen's career as a Librarian started at McGill University Library in February 1999. After serving as Head of the East Asian Library at the University of Minnesota for ten years, she was appointed Head

Her research interests are primarily in history and trend of English monograph and serial publications on East Asian studies; archival resources on China in North America; and history of East Asian libraries in North America. Su Chen's recent major compilation projects include *Glossary of Library and Information Sciences: English/Chinese Chinese/English* (K. G. Saur, 2005), *The Archives of the Young Men's Christian Association in China at the University of Minnesota Libraries: the Annual Report (1896-1949) with Biographical Sketch of Foreign Secretaries and City Association Building Description* (Guangxi Normal University Press, 2012), and *Archival Resources of Republican China in North America* (Columbia University Press, 2015).

TODD GRAPPONE

Associate University Librarian, Digital Initiatives & Information Technology, University of California, Los Angeles.

Grappone has leadership, management, and policy and planning responsibilities for all digital initiatives and information technology services and operations at UCLA Library. He has direct supervisory responsibility enterprise-wide departments dedicated to collections and programs in the College Library (Powell) and the East Asian Library (EAL), digital initiatives and information technology Digital Library Program (DLP), Library Computing Services (LCS), Library Information Technology (LIT), the Social Science Data Archive and Library Web Services (LWS). Grappone also has responsibility for oversight of services, operations, and programmatic initiatives of multiple Research Commons within the UCLA Library System. He represents the Library on information technology groups on the UCLA campus, within the UC System, and externally

PHILIP KENT

University Librarian and Executive Director, Collections, The University of Melbourne

Philip joined the University in March 2009 following an extensive career in universities and CSIRO, Australia's national science agency. In addition to his library positions he has experience in information technology, knowledge and information management, archives and records management, risk and audit roles.

Following the Information Futures Commission and the development of a 10 year information strategy for the University, the Library was reinvigorated under his leadership. A key priority during 2009 - 2014 was to increase the profile and effectiveness of the Library's contribution to the University's research effort. Access to the unique cultural collections held by the Library was advanced. Innovative learning spaces were developed to support the teaching and learning mission as well as implementing new technologies to support student learning.

In 2015 a new organisational model was implemented. Philip's focus is on strategic, policy and representational matters related to the Library while the operational programs have transferred to University Services. He also leads university-wide responsibility for the rich Cultural Collections held at Melbourne through his strategic role as Executive Director, Collections.

Philip holds an MBA from the Mt Eliza Business School now merged into the Melbourne Business School. He is a Director of CAVAL Ltd. He chairs the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL's), resources purchasing consortium, Chairs the Group of Eight (Go8) Librarians and Chairs the Editorial Board for the *Journal of the Australian Library and Information Association*. Philip concludes his 4 year term as a member of the arXiv Members Advisory Board at Cornell University Library at the end of 2016.
